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CSIRO Innovation Connections Programme

Dr Jacqueline Watt from CSIRO who runs the Innovation Connections Programme will be visiting Wagga on the 24th March. This scheme has funding to help SMEs connect with Universities for specific research projects.

Innovation Connections Grant

Projects must be in collaboration with a Publicly Funded Research Organisation (PFRO) in order to receive grant funding. The project should develop a new idea with commercial potential. Your Innovation Facilitator will suggest which of the three grants available will suit your business needs:

- placing a researcher in the business (up to a maximum of \$50,000)
- placing a researcher from the business into a PFRO (up to a maximum of \$50,000)
- employing a graduate or post-graduate in the business (up to a maximum of \$30,000)

ACU Titular Fellowships

Academic and professional staff at ACU member universities are invited to apply for an ACU Titular Fellowship. These fellowships provide funding of up to GBP 5,000 for a collaborative international research or fact-finding visit, either to a member university overseas or in industry, commerce, or public service.

ACU Titular Fellowships are a great opportunity for university staff to create and strengthen links with other member institutions and to share research expertise and professional best practice.

Eleven fellowships are available. Some are limited to specific subject areas or hosted by specific institutions.

The deadline for applications is Friday 12 May 2017.

Early Career Academic grants

Applications are now open for this year's round of Early Career Academic Grants. Grants are awarded to academic staff working at ACU member universities, to enable participation in an academic conference in another Commonwealth country. Applications are open to early career academics who have not previously had the opportunity to travel outside their home region for work purposes.

The grants aim to facilitate international mobility and career development by opening up opportunities for early career academics from ACU member universities. Since the scheme began in 2013, staff from 73 different member institutions have benefitted.

In 2017, a minimum of 30 grants are on offer, with a maximum amount of GBP £2000 available for each recipient. Applications close on **Sunday 2 April 2017**.

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Report on E-Health Workshop titled “Remote Health using Technology (RHT-2017) - 2017

An E-Health Workshop on *Remote Health using Technology* (RHT-2017) was held on 9th February 2017 at Young.

E-health is one of the themes within the CSU Machine Learning (CML) Research Unit at CSU. It brings modern IT developments to health practice. Due to geographical distance from capital cities a major portion of regional people cannot access high quality health services, like those in major cities. The aim of the group is to tackle issues related to E-health through technology such as computational intelligence, data analysis, and machine vision research. In the digital era, with easier electronic communications and availability of different body sensor devices, this group is conducting research across four research themes: disease prediction/detection, mobile E-Health, medical imaging, and E-Health security to provide world class health services to more remote people through collaborating with health service professionals, local bodies and government agencies.

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New Human Research Ethics Application (HREA)

The National Ethics Application Form (NEAF) has recently been replaced with the Human Research Ethics Application (HREA) Form, and can be accessed via <https://hrea.gov.au/>. Both forms are currently available on the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) website. The NEAF will be decommissioned on 30 June 2017.

Researchers have some flexibility in choosing when to move to the new HREA Form as the Charles Sturt University Human Research Ethics Committee and Faculty Human Ethics Committees will continue to accept the NEAF up to and including the April 2017 meetings.
